Recap of the first international workshop




Figure 0.1. This diagram shows the structure of the Strategic Plan for Biodiversity 2011-2020. Progress towards a 2050 Vision is achieved through a 2020 Mission. In turn, the Mission is addressed through five Strategic Goals under which the 20 Aichi Biodiversity Targets are organized, and supported by implementation mechanisms. The Strategic Plan serves as a flexible framework for the establishment of national and regional targets and it promotes the coherent and effective implementation of the three objectives of the Convention on Biological Diversity.

Framing and modus operandi

The third workshop aims to exchange views on how to address the request in CBD/SBI/REC/2/19, para 7: civil society organizations are invited to submit by 15 December 2018 INITIAL VIEWS "on the aspects of the SCOPE AND CONTENT of the post-2020 global biodiversity framework, including (a) THE SCIENTIFIC UNDERPINNING of the scale and scope of actions necessary to make progress towards the 2050 Vision; and (b) a POSSIBLE STRUCTURE for the post-2020 biodiversity framework





b) Possible structure

A focused, quantifiable, and communicable **goal** so the world clearly understands the value of nature.

2030 Goal

Quantified <u>objectives</u> for the state of biodiversity: e.g., for species abundance, ecosystems, nature's contributions to people, etc. These targets are indicative of the state of the world we want to see in 2030.

Post-2020

Objectives Biodiversity
Framework

Priority <u>actions</u> needed for implementation. The level of ambition and implementation would need to be raised over time to impact the "Objectives".

Actions

Supporting and <u>enabling conditions</u> that are needed across interventions for actions to be effective. Examples of these means of implementation include good governance, financing, capacity building and communications.




